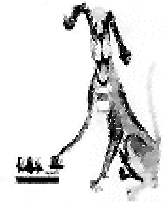

Silent Key

It is with deep regret that I inform you that Elias "BUS" (Buster) Etheridge, K4IX, a co-founder of the Virginia CW Traffic Nets in 1947, became a Silent Key on Thursday, April 10, in his home at 9:30 a.m., at the age of 80.

Licensed for 65 years, recently "BUS" had been fighting cancer with the most optimistic outlook imaginable, but despite all odds, he succumbed to his illness earlier this week. "BUS" maintained his strong faith, and I am confident that he is enjoying the fruits of his faithfulness.

"BUS" was active daily on the air, in the morning on 40 meters, he held high-speed CW ragchews with his bug-toting buddies, and in the evening on 80 meters, his "bug" was heard on the Virginia Nets.

"BUS" was the notorious leader of "Buster's Beach Bums", an annual Field Day group which attracted competitive CW hacks from hundreds of miles away to participate in their Field Day effort.

"BUS" was the driving force behind the establishment of the USS Wisconsin Radio Club, N4WIS, the USS Wisconsin (BB-64) being "permanently" berthed alongside "Nauticus", in downtown Norfolk, Virginia. (continued page 2)

I had met personally with "BUS", once at the Richmond FrostFest, and again at a QCWA Old Dominion Chapter 202 meeting, where he enthralled the audience with his lengthy history and philosophies about Ham Radio.

For my part, "BUS" will be sorely missed. He was the only Virginia Net participant with such a distinctive fist, one which I shall never forget.

30 METERS

A suggestion from Jack, KA8WNO-

One of our arfers was talking to another a few days ago and wondering about 30 meters.

A few years back, when W8BO was running ARTS net most of the time, and I QNI'd most days, there were days when 40 mtr cdx weren't too good, as happens on all tfc nets at one time or another. Someone suggested 30 mtrs and then a few

tried it for dependability. Later on, it was used altogether on Saturdays. Most times it worked out well for medium and long range use. There is the advantage of no SSB or contests conducted there. I checked it last evening and found several QSOs going on there.

It might be a good idea to see which arfers can go there for tfc. We polled the tfc gang on ARTS and then knew who could. I use a 40 mtr dipole with antenna tuner for 10mHZ.

[A good suggestion. How about it, arfers? Who can work 30 meters? Please let us know.]

DAYS GONE BY... Part 4

Don't know why I wanted to leave Port Aransas. Like a lot of single military guys, I tired of where I was and what was going on at the time. At any rate, I was given the necessary tickets and told to report to NOB Norfolk.

Seemed like a mass of confusion at the Norfolk base - hundreds of sailors being sent from one building to another to get or do something. It was kind of a receiving station where we were rerouted somewhere or another. I ended up sort of attached to about 300 other radio guys. (women in the navy were as scarce as hen's teeth in those days.)

We were sent for a general mass physical exam. Imagine 300 men in a big circle inside a huge building, all bent forward, stark-naked and all facing away from the center of the circle..... another time we reported for cholera shots. Those were nauseating enough, but when it was my turn, the hypodermic needle broke into, part of it sticking out of my arm. Then a series of lines where we were issued items that an infantry soldier would normally carry into the field/ Items included a 30 ought 6 rifle, canteen, shelter half, et cetera and a pack to put it in. I suppose this was a ploy

to confuse any spies that may be watching what was going on.

Finally, after about a day and a half of this, with little or no sleep, we were marched aboard a merchant ship fitted to carry troops.

A few hours later, the next morning as I remember, we left Hampton Roads and sailed east. One army item we used always for eating was a mess kit that was issued. Our dining room was a number of long tables where we stood to eat. A few days into our trip greasy mess kits caught up with 200 or more of us. Imagine the mess with a couple of days of diarrhea! And about that time the Atlantic got a little rough and then of course, seasickness struck many of us. we were all issued feather beds.... well, not exactly; iron framed cots with stretched canvas in a forward hold of the ship bedded down the most of us. You could have the bottom bunk, or climb on up as high as about 8 bunks. Holiday Inns were a scarcity at sea!! This was, I think, 1943, and our ship was headed for North Africa, as Europe had not yet been invaded, and Rommel was still a force in Africa.

I was fascinated with the straits of Gibraltar, especially the high rock cliffs on the on the African side, with little clouds hiding some of the higher peaks. Then it was on to some place to dock. We had had enough of cramped quarters and wondered what radio assignments lay ahead. *(To be continued)*

2. Another thing that has always bugged me, regardless of the specific organization of traffic handlers is the fact whenever a roster of net membership is published, it is done in the format

of an address book, which to me is totally awkward or even useless.

Traffic is listed by geographic destination (not by other elements of net participants) and common sense should dictate that net members should be listed in the same format, so one knows the exact QTH and probable routing. I would think even a veteran NCS would prefer this format. -K1BTD

Bunch and "Geo" climb from pure frustration to the heights of pure resonance in their explorations.

A journalistic history of the life and times in Amateur Radio of George Hart, WINJM - by George Hart WINJM

Part 6: The Great Discovery

All the next day, Bunch and I, with George Suydam Kibitizing part of the time, sorted through the treasures. Bunch started construction of a new transmitter that, he predicted, would make 3NF an outstanding signal on the air, with a pure DC note instead of our weak, raspy AC. Again it was "breadboard" type of construction with all connections and wiring in plain sight with no effort to conceal or make it look neat. Metal rack and panel, and chassis construction was only for commercial and sophisticated amateur installations.

We were off the air for a few days during this period, for the 210 transmitter had to be cannibalized so some of its parts could be used in the new setup. No changes, however, were made in the receiver.

At last everything was in readiness for testing, with the new DC power supply mounted on a separate breadboard. Safety was not a consideration, we considered ourselves indestructible. Everything was out in the open. When Bunch threw the plate voltage knife switch, the 281 rectifier tubes protested but did not

arc over, despite the 1000 volts (less voltage drop through the overloaded tubes) they were being subjected to. When he pressed the key the big transformer groaned and the 852 tube tantalum plate turned red. The plate current meter showed 100 ma. and the antenna RF meter moved only slightly higher than it had with the 210. Undaunted, Bunch called a CQ, but received no answer. We didn't use spot frequencies in those days, because unless you had crystal control; (which only the more elite stations boasted) and a highly selective receiver you were never sure just where your signal was in the band (or out of it). After a CQ (CQ CQ CQ NU 3NF 3NF 3NF, repeated three times then standing by with an ARK) you tuned over the entire band for calls. Bunch was distressed at not hearing any one calling us after several attempts. So he called other stations' CQ call: (8BOE, 8BOE, 8BOE NU 3NF 3NF 3NF repeated three times then ARK), finally received an answer and a signal report of R4 (fair) RAC (rectified AC). With such a big increase in input power and a filtered supply, the result was very disappointing.

He turned the key over to me, but my results were no better. "Hell!", he said. "We're not getting out any better than before. And Why RAC? We should have a pure DC note." He threw up his hands in disgust and walked away. I continued operating; made two or three more contacts, finally decided we weren't getting out as good as before. And the signal reports continued to be RAC. I persevered for several days with no better result, until Ed decided to increase the voltage to 1500. Surprisingly, the 281 rectifiers did not break down but although the plate current increased, the antenna RF meter showed no increase in deflection, contacts remained rare and, when made, signal reports were low. In

desperation, Bunch removed all power supply components except the big transformer. This gave a slightly higher deflection on the RF meter, 150 ma. Plate current, a return to a.c. signal reports, and some of the electric light fixtures in the house glowed dully without the switch being on. Bunch even applied the full 3000 volts across the transformer output, still without any appreciable improvement in signal reports although the 852 plate turned almost white. What was wrong? Of course I had no explanation and Bunch, completely frustrated, concentrated on his social activities to my complete exclusion. No word from Uncle Sam, although the BCI must have continued, perhaps grew Worse. He probably gave up. Bunch and I completely forgot that the purpose of the major rebuilding program had been to placate Uncle Sam. All we cared about was "getting out," putting a stronger and higher quality signal on the air. We couldn't understand why increasing the input power didn't have this effect. Eventually, at my continued pleading; Bunch took time off from his social schedule and returned our (his) station to its former status. The 852, the big transformer and the other power supply components went into storage. The restoration of the 210 into its former configuration seemed to make the performance even worse than it had been before. Bunch didn't seem to care. I cared a lot, but my technical ability was very limited. I was almost completely dependent on my big brother. *(Part 6 to be continued)*

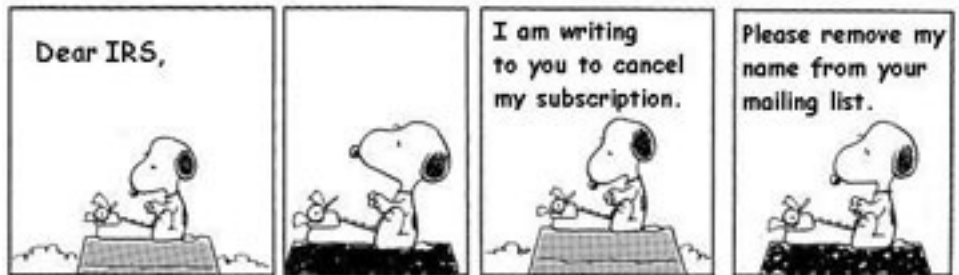
