Origin of the QN Signals

The QNA-QNZ signals did not come from ARRL. They originated in Michigan where the first one-spot traffic net began in 1935. QMN has been in daily operation these sixty-some years on 3663 at 7:30 and 10:00 PM daily and check-ins are welcome.

It's always been said that nothing good ever came out of a committee, but there have been notable exceptions. One was the King James Bible in 1611. Another, the QN signals devised for net use together with the original concept of a National Traffic System, by the Detroit Amateur Radio Association QMN Net Committee in 1939. The QN signals were published that fall in the DARA/QMN Bulletin and immediately spread far and wide on the new area nets that were following QMN's pioneering example.

Ralph Thetreat, W8FX, aka Tate, chaired the Net Committee and personally saw to it that the QN list, together with an excellent outline of the QMN operation and its national system implications, were given the widest possible dissemination. In recognition of these efforts, W8FX was appointed Secretary/Treasurer of the QMN Net and held that office for over forty years.

Tate was always somewhat bitter, though, about ARRL refusing to even acknowledge the existence of the QN signals until years after they were in common use nationwide. The League was chicken, he told us, just because a couple of the old aeronautical QNs were still being used on some obscure overseas Pan American CW circuit. In a final touch of irony they were published at last in February 1947 QST, but without any credit to either DARA or QMN.

Nevertheless, like QST, Tate was devoted to amateur radio and left a very substantial legacy to the ARRL, specifically for a 'decent and adequate' W1AW antenna system. Their startlingly improved signal since has been a fitting memorial to W8FX.

Geo tangles with the Army Amateur Radio Service

CHAPTER 19 - THE AARS ACTIVITIES AT W8YA

When I came to W8YA in 1932, the station was already involved in the Army Amateur Radio System. AARS was run almost entirely by licensed amateurs, affiliated with but not enlisted in the U.S. Army Signal Corps, primarily for the purpose of training in Army procedures and the handling of third party messages.

Participating amateurs used their own call letters in Army-sponsored networks in the amateur bands. The AARS was a commanding presence in amateur radio traffic handling at the time, and for many years afterward right up until WWII. When I arrived, AARS participation was handled almost entirely by Norm Young, whose amateur call I seem to have forgotten, Norm was a competent operator and, although only sophomore, prominent on the staff.

AARS also used two frequencies outside amateur bands (3497.5 and 6990 kc.) for its higher echelon operation, using call letters assigned from the WL block. W8YA was Pennsylvania net control and used WLQJ when operating on 3497.5. 6990 was used by AARS only at night. During the daylight hours it was used by WAR for official Army traffic.

I had little to do with the AARS phase of W8YA operation in my freshman year, but Ed and I had participated in it in a small way from W3NF and I was familiar with it. Some time during my sophomore year I was called into Gil Crossley's office in Engineering E and he explained that a dispatch from Washington had requested W8YA to take over as first alternate to the AARS main control station, WLM, located in the Munitions Building in Washington, D.C. Norm Young had requested to be relieved of AARS responsibilities so he could concentrate on academics. Our AARS call letters would be changed from WLQJ to WLMA and our operating responsibilities would no longer be restricted to Pennsylvania or the Third Corps Area (CA). It was a major step up in the system and Gil wanted to know if I could handle it.

Not knowing the full requirements, I nevertheless felt sure I could, and Gil tended to agree with me, but my academics were not in the best of shape, and this was a major concern. I was spending too much time at the station already, often at the expense of study in my difficult pre-veterinary curriculum. Nevertheless, it was decided that we should accept the assignment on a tentative basis, which was the basis offered in the first place.

My class schedule, that first semester of 1933-4, was less demanding on Thursday and Saturday. There were no classes on Saturday afternoon or on Sunday, but I didn't want to be tied down on weekends because of fraternity social obligations and/or weekend trips home. So my training schedule as alternate AARS net control station for the entire U.S. and possessions would involve only Wednesday evenings and an hour Thursday after classes. I would show up at W8YA on Wednesday after classes, put the rig on 3497.5 and make contact with WLM in Washington, signing our AARS call, WLMA. The procedure was to "clear the hook" at WLM - that is, take all the message traffic on hand at WLM to be sent to each of the corps area stations throughout the U.S. (only 48 states then), and also the Panama Canal Zone and the Territory of Hawaii. I don't recall any Alaskan or Caribbean contacts. None of the messages was official, just routine amateur radio traffic ordinarily handled in the amateur bands. Even the message format was the same, for by then ARRL had adopted the Signal Corps format for message traffic.

This was a daunting project, for most of the operators at AARS Corps Area (CA) level were highly skilled, many of them operated by amateurs like myself from their home stations either as alternates to the AARS Corps Area (CA) control stations or substitutes for those stations where no AARS control station existed. My Wednesday evenings were spent contacting representatives of each CA, either on 3497.5 or 6990 kc., on an hourly or half-hourly basis -- nine CAs, plus WLXL at Fort Clayton, Canal Zone, and WVQB (later WLXB) at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. The operation in most cases was swift and precise, either with AARS stations operated by Army personnel at CA headquarters or an alternate or substitute. Operation in AARS was a major part of my amateur radio activity during those years and my memories of it are precise and pleasurable. The First Corps Area (CA) contact was with WLG, operated by Percy Noble, W1BVR from his home station in Westfield, MA. Perce was a long-time ARRL director and vice president who became a close personal friend. Since at the beginning there was no AARS station at Corps Area headquarters in Boston, Perce was permitted to use its call, WLG. Even after such a station was put on the air, Perce continued using WLG and the CA station used WLGA - an exception to the general rule. Second CA headquarters was at Governor's Island in New York Harbor, AARS call letters WLN (W2SC). They did have a station but often the signal was down. The schedule was sometimes kept by W2PF, David Talley, whose AARS call I don't remember, I do remember that Dave had a very peculiar swing to his "fist" that

was very difficult to copy until you became used to it. Third CA HQ was at Fort McHenry, Baltimore, MD. with AARS call WLQ (W3SN). Fourth CA was in Fort McPherson, GA. with call WLR. I never heard WLR. Usually the schedule was kept by alternate WLRY, who was the renowned "Dixie Squinch Owl" whose name and amateur call escape me at the moment of writing. Fifth CA was in Columbus, Oh. WLH. This schedule was kept by W8ZG/W8 GZ using WLH on 3497.5, who was none other than Loren Windom, the inventor of the Windom antenna and a prominent military and amateur radio figure. I recall some derogatory exchanges between "Windy" and "Dixie," but believe they were close personal friends. Sixth CA HQ was in Chicago, WLT, schedule usually kept by an alternate but WLT did have an AARS stations. Seventh CA HQ was at Fort Omaha, NE., WLU (W9BNT). WLU had a super operator but I never knew who he was or if he held an amateur license. Eighth CA HQ was at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, TX, WU (W5OW), WU usually had a good signal and good operator on 6990. Ninth CA HQ was at the Presidio, San Francisco, WLV. All these AARS CA HQ stations had amateur calls and could be operated by licensed amateurs in the amateur bands. Thanks to my early training in traffic handling at W3NF, I fitted right in with the AARS operators on 3497.5 and 6990 kc., most of whom were of highest quality. WLMA (W8YA) became a Wednesday night fixture on the AARS world network.

The AARS station at Fort Clayton, C.Z. used the call WLXL and usually had a strong signal on 6990. I don't remember its amateur call; it would have been a K5. But the biggest challenge of the evening was contacting WVQB in Hawaii on 6990 kc. at 11:30 p.m. Their amateur call was K6DV. Surprisingly enough, the contact was usually successful, with quite a few messages exchanged. The operator out there was very good and usually reported our signal good. The "outlying" AARS stations were given WLX calls. I don't know why WVQB was used at first, but the call was later changed to WLXB, which I always felt never had the "swing" of WVQB.

SOWP

THOSE WERE GREAT TIMES -- Often told by those in the Society of Wireless Pioneers and others - W2MTA

He was regular as a proverbial clock in his duties with the NTS in New Jersey and Second Region Net as he made his Wednesday night liaisons from NJN to 2RN and then EAN. Bill Shaw, WB2VEJ, then in his

mid-eighties was portrayed in the NJN Newsletter of September 1972.

AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF WB2VEJ

I was born in Cape May City in August, 1888. My first code experience was on a land line which five of us kids had put up between our homes, attached to the houses, the electric, and telephone poles.

About this time, we heard the new wireless station "CP" of the Marine Transmission Co. in Cape May. The receivers we used were made from battery carbons filed to a sharp edge with a needle across it and a battery in series with the headphones. I had a ham rig on the air with call letters "WS" from 1907-1909, until going with the Marconi Co. in 1910.

My first ham license, W3HJH, was received in 1937, while I was ill and confined to my room with heart trouble. After going back on the railroad pounding a key all day, and having to move occasionally, I forgot ham radio as I had all the code I needed. I didn't return to the ham bands till December 1965, when I was issued WB2VEJ.

My first job was with Western Union at office "CY" in Cape May. During summer months I handled 300 messages a day as well as a few thousand words of press copy one or two nights a week. Did you ever try to send from 7:30 p.m. till 2:30 a.m. maintaining a speed of at least 25 wpm on a scratcher. Try it--its fun. All for \$60 a month. During the following few years I worked for the Reading Railroad in the Cape May (CM) and Camden (C) Dispatchers Offices. In 1910 I returned to Cape May to join the Marconi Wireless Co. at MCY/WCY until 1915.

My next stint of employment was with Bethlehem Steel at Cape May Test grounds from, Feb.1916 to Jan.1922. I started as telegraph operator and had time keeper and first aid duties added and then advanced to office manager and, believe it or not, surveyor, laying out firing ranges up the beach for the test shootings of munitions for the British, French, Russian and American navies. As plant manager in 1921, I oversaw dismantling and sale of all equipment as well as shipment of all unignited explosives. I returned to the Reading RR for the next 12 years.

I started a Marine Radio Service business which lasted till W.W.II when the government outlawed all private yacht radios. That put us out of business.

I then joined RCA in Camden working in Quality Control, testing equipment ranging from Police FM rigs to 50KW broadcast transmitters. I tested the 10KW rig used by WWV in Washington D.C. for many years.

I have been retired for a number of years and greatly enjoy participation in NJN as well as 2RN and EAN.

WB2VEJ cont...A note postmarked May 30, 1974 was received at W2MTA from Henry Shaw, Bill's son:

Dear OM, My father Bill, WB2VEJ, asked me to write you to cancel all his assignments due to illness. He had a virus and is still bedfast, picking up slowly. He hopes to be back on the air in a couple of weeks. 73 Henry Shaw

Bill held his last NJN to 2RN liaison on Wednesday May 15, replaced by W2RUX on the 22nd and then by WA2DSA for many months.

Bill was the exemplar of dependability in 2RN functions warranting recognition. His communications were clear and crisp, and his knowledge of the goings on of the SOWP were made known to me by the many copies of the newsletters he often mailed to me. We needed to sustain his memory in some manner, thus was born The WB2VEJ Memorial Award issued to those station/operators in 2RN operations that had demonstrated outstanding performance and dependability. An action was begun in 1974 that saw such stalwarts as W2CS(x-WA2PJL), W2FR(x-W8SIE/W4DLA/W2SEI), W2FEB, W2RUF(x-W8NTF), W2SWE, W2UEZ, W2WSS and the many others recognized for their annual performance with 2RN over the thirty years now past. God bless Bill Shaw.
