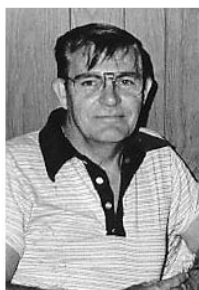
On Jack's QRZ.com page he notes only that he was a World War II Navy Radio Man on Kwajalein Atoll.

Jack had a great sense of humor. He was a photographer for the Watertown Daily Times for many years. I still have a picture he sent me of a huge pile of snow with a homemade sign sticking out the top that said "HELP."

I also remember the pre-net qsos every morning (usually 30 minutes before the net) that "kept the frequency open." Regulars were Jack, Gale NJ4L, Larry W4SUS, Doug K4ZB and other net members who often came by with WX reports and opinions on the news or other tidbits of information. I especially remember that all of them had good fists and always welcomed whoever joined in.

Jack set a very good example for all of us as a good operator, a fine net manager and a good friend. We remember: Jack, K2GWN SK.

SACKETS HARBOR, N.Y. - John J. "Jack" Zuzula Jr., 81, of 104 Central Smith Dr. Sackets Harbor passed away at 10:25 a.m. Monday, Jan. 12, at Samaritan Keep Home, Watertown. He was a resident there since being transferred from Samaritan Medical Center on Dec.30.

Born Oct. '1 1, '1927, in Watertown, the son of John J. and Corinne Zuzula, he entered the Navy on

Oct. 30, 1944, and served in the South Pacific Theatre until June 1946. He was a radioman in the Navy and transmitted the terms of the Japanese surrender over the radio. He returned from the service and graduated in '1947 from Sackets Harbor High School. He also served in the Naval Reserve from 1947 until June 1950.

He married Marion E. Peer on June 4, 1949, by the Rev. John Kennedy at St. Andrews Catholic Church in Sackets Harbor; Mr. Usual worked nine years for New York Telephone Company as a service engineer.

He was a photographer for 30 years at the Watertown Daily Times, retiring as photo editor in 1989. He was one of the first photographers to use a 35mm camera in the North Country, a standard used today.

He played town team baseball for Brownville, Adams and Sackets Harbor. He managed Little League, high school, town team and American Legion baseball teams. He was also a baseball and softball umpire. Mr. Zuzula was also an avid golfer and ham radio operator.

Surviving are his wife, Marion, Sackets Harbor, two daughters and their husbands, Kendra and Dr. David Kohl, Blacksburg, Va., and Mary and James Lawrence, Watertown; five grandchildren and three great-grandsons.

A memorial service will be held 11 a.m. Thursday at the Sulphur Springs Methodist Church with Rev. Mona Fargo officiating. Burial will be in the spring with military honors in Sulphur Springs Cemetery. His body will be cremated. There are no calling hours.

HAMBONE'S DIG OF THE MONTH

In memory of Jack Zuzula, Jr., K2GWN, here follows a 1987 adventure of Hambone and Jack as reported from Traffic Call, Number 103, of December 1987. Jack joined the Silent Keys on January 10th in Watertown NY. He was formerly Photo Editor for The Watertown Daily Times, residing in Sackets Harbor. He served for a number of years as net manager, first for the Morning Watch Net and later the Hit and Bounce Net beginning in January 1979, prior to W4DJ. Jack's dry humor sure will be missed.

Hambone is looking for a new dog house home. "At press time last month, poor Hambone was locked up by the animal warden, charged with taking a nip

out of Ray Green, Democratic candidate for sheriff in Jefferson County, New York, when he was only paying a friendly call on brother Jack K2GWN. Well! Did things take a dramatic turn of events or did things take a dramatic turn of events! It was not just that Green's campaign to "get tough on dogs" helped him pull off a startling upset in the Nov. 3 election, to become the first Democratic Sheriff in the county in 26 years, that got Hambone out of jail and made him honorary mascot of the sheriff's department. It was a tip Hambone passed along to Green while they were in court awaiting the start of the hearing.

"It seems that Ray Green and Hambone found out that they had something in common: a deep interest in investments. This was a week before the Dow-Jones plunged 500 points. The tip Hambone whispered to Green was short and straight to the point: dog biscuit futures. Over the years Ray Green had learned to spot a good tip and this one knocked him right over, it was obvious. He went out and sold off 2/3 of his stocks and bonds, before the bottom fell out, and shifted into dog biscuit futures.

"On the Tuesday after the crash, there was the headline across the front page of The Watertown Daily Times:

"STOCK MARKET GOES TO THE DOGS"

"Thus, it was for his life-saving tip that Hambone has not only had all charges against him dropped, but he's sittin' on top of the world around Watertown, New York!"

RANDOM RECOLLECTIONS OF AN OLD HAM

Chapter 28 - The Hurricane

It was only about three weeks after I arrived in Connecticut that the hurricane of 1938 hit us. I don't remember the exact date or day of the week, but I do remember that it was one of the rare days when I was on the early (3 to 9) shift, probably because Hal had some personal business to attend to, or maybe construction and maintenance were in such good shape that he decided to give me a break. In any case, I arrived at 3 p.m., put my car in the garage and proceeded to attend to some paper work, in this case making out QSL cards. W1AW sent cards to every station we worked, and a card file record was kept for each station worked showing the name of the operator, location and any details gleaned from the contact or contacts with that station. Thus, when a contact was made the operator (Hal or I) could refer to the file, ascertain if it was a first contact or, if contacted before, be able to address the other operator by name and be aware of his location. The file, in other words, was our "memory," and often the operator at the other end was amazed that we knew so much about him. It made for good membership and even non-member relations. The file was my idea, and so keeping it current was part of my job.

It was a dark day outside. Rain was coming down and the wind was already quite brisk. As the afternoon progressed, the wind grew stronger and the rain was more intense. But I sat oblivious until I felt the building shudder and the electricity went off. I investigated the Memorial Lobby and found that the wind was blowing rain through the cracks around the front door. I went into the garage and got the mop and a bucket, mopped up the water on the floor, but as I was doing so I heard a splintering crash outdoors. Looking out on Main Street I saw a large tree laying across the road. It wasn't until then that I realized the intensity of the storm.

This hurricane had no name. The Weather Bureau didn't start giving them names until after WWII, but it was being tracked as it came up the coast and started heading out to sea. It was predicted to continue northeastward and die out in the north Atlantic, but it had suddenly switched due northward and hit with full force on the eastern part of Long island, Rhode Island and Cape Cod. The Hartford

area was getting only the outer edge, but that was bad enough. Newington was without power for several days and W1AW was silent.

No damage was done to the station building except a few asphalt shingles were torn off the roof. But our new magnificent station sat dark and silent. No provision had been made for emergency power at the station. Later in the afternoon, as the intensity of the storm decreased, Mr. Handy and Hal showed up, saying they were both concerned for my safety but I suspect they were even more concerned for the building and antennas. After looking around they departed, saying I might as well go home because the downed tree across Main Street had torn down the power lines and restoration of power was unlikely at least for a day, probably more. Many other trees throughout the town and indeed the entire area were also down.

I stayed until it got too dark to work, then got my car out of the garage and headed toward Hartford and Annawan Street. Several detours were necessary to get around downed trees and flooded streets, but I finally made it. The power at Annawan Street was still on. Hal was in his room across the hall, and when he heard me come in he came over and told me that Mr. Handy had invited us both to his house in West Hartford where the power was also on to operate for emergency communications purposes, because commercial electricity and communications in Rhode Island and Cape Cod had been disrupted and amateur radio was being called on to assist. I gladly agreed to go, but Hal opted to remain in his room and operate from his personal station.

There followed two days of almost continuous operation from W1BDI. Operating Ed Handy's station was an adventure unlike any I have ever had in operating a station other than my own (up to this point in my amateur career I had never had my own station!) The second floor station was a veritable clutter of equipment, arranged in a highly unorthodox manner quite in keeping with Handy's own eccentric demeanor. All I did was operate. Ed Handy did all the setting up, frequency changing, tuning, accompanied by grunts, throat clearings and nervous fidgeting. It was a real adventure. Mrs. Handy kept us well fed and I managed to get some sleep in a spare room. We maintained contact with other amateur stations in eastern Connecticut, Rhode Island and southeastern Massachusetts, many of them operating on emergency power, handling mostly personal welfare messages but also a few official dispatches. Commercial wire facilities were in bad shape and several days of frantic work would be required to get them back to normal. I seem to recall that we had another assistant, a non-ham

who handled telephone calls, and a couple of times a newspaper called and wanted to interview Mr. Handy regarding the part amateurs were playing. The incident made me pretty well acquainted with the Handy family and gave me a closer insight into the personality of Ed Handy himself.
